Lee Kelly (1932-2022) and Bonnie Bronson (1940-1990) met and married in 1961 and remained so until Bronson's untimely death in a mountaineering accident. Kelly had begun showing, not without some controversies, in the Portland area in 1958; Bronson had achieved considerable local recognition by the early 1960s. Their earliest work was rooted in the AbEx terroir, but it became quickly apparent that both were looking for something else.

Highly proficient painters within that idiom, Bronson in particular, both largely abandoned it in favor of what became their well-known styles. In Kelly's case, of course, that was monumental Corten and stainless steel sculptures, for Bronson low-relief metal and cardboard wall sculptures, often in subtly shaded monochromes. In both cases, their formal vocabularies were largely established by the early to middle 1970s.

They were in fact frequent collaborators in the 1960s to 1970s, itself a question worth its own study, but there was, perhaps unsurprisingly, a rich though often indirect dialog between their works. The eclectic selection of works here, drawn from throughout their respective careers, show some of those points of contact and reference. [N.B. – additional examples of some of their works are also on view in The Barn.] In particular, we are looking here at how one can see in their works continuing references to the articulation of space, both positive and negative. And so we see them confronting similar problems, arriving at solutions sometimes similar, sometimes quite distinct. Consistent throughout, however, are constant reminders of the far-reaching implications originally found in the Cubist *papier colle*.

Lee Kelly was born in McCall, Idaho in 1932, and died on March 29, 2022 living and working at Leland Iron Works, his home and studio in Oregon City since 1963, where he moved with his thenwife Bonnie Bronson, beginning the transformation of a former dairy farm into a complex of studio and living spaces.

Lee Kelly was a major figure in Oregon art for more than five decades, dominating the public art landscape in Oregon and Washington from the 1970s and 1980s and beyond. His work was the subject of major survey and retrospective exhibitions at The Art Gym, Marylhurst College (1983 & 1995), Reed College (1976-77) and, most recently, the Portland Art Museum (2010).

Oregon artist Bonnie Bronson was born in 1940 in Portand. After several years at the University of Kansas and the University of Oregon, she returned to Portland. She met Lee Kelly in 1961; they married that same year and moved from Portland to Oregon City in 1963, Her career lasted from 1964 to 1990, ended by her death in a mountaineering accident on Mt. Adams.

Her work was shown in Portland and throughout the Pacific Northwest at, among others, Blackfish Gallery, the Fountain Gallery, the Art Gym at Marylhurst College and the Elizabeth Leach Gallery. Her work was the subject of solo exhibition at the Portland Art Museum in 1979 and a posthumous retrospective there in 1993. In the fall of 2011, her work was the subject of a major retrospective exhibition, *Bonnie Bronson: Works 1960–1990* at the Pacific Northwest College of Art.

The Estates of Lee Kelly & Bonnie Bronson are represented by the Elizabeth Leach Gallery, Portland.
